Emergency/Bioterrorism Readiness

We (SCGHD) continue to take the lead for directing and coordinating the response for public health emergencies. The district has continued to work closely with medical providers (hospitals, clinics, physicians) and First Responders (emergency medical services, fire/rescue, and law enforcement) to ensure joint response plans are

developed and practiced.

Throughout the year, SCGHD employees have represented the County on various local, regional, and State anti-bioterrorism planning committees. We are assisting in building the foundation for a local medical resource core. We are helping to write regional protocols for communication, governance,

and epidemiological response to outbreaks and disasters. More staff are trained in the National Incident Management System. We look forward to continuing the relationships we have forged with our community partners and assisting the citizens of Seneca County to be prepared for public health emergencies.

Human Resource Division

The Human Resource Division directed a variety of activities during 2007, including but not limited to, determining and fulfilling staffing needs, recruiting and training the best employees, dealing with performance issues, ensuring personnel and management practices conform to various regulations, managing of benefits and compensation, employee records, and personnel policy changes/additions.

Vital Statistics

Birth and Death records from 1909 to the present are located in the Vital Statistics Department. These include all Seneca County and all Fostoria City Birth and Deaths. Birth and Death Records prior to 1908 are located at the Probate Court.

Our Department continues to enter the death records from 1909 for Seneca County into our computer software program. This process has helped the Vital Statistics Division to be more efficient in our service to the public.

To obtain a birth certificate, the birth name, date of birth, father's name and mother's maiden name are required. For a death certificate, the name on the certificate and date of

death are required. If you wish to receive a birth or death record by mail, please send the above information, along with a self-addressed stamped envelope to 71 S. Washington Street, Suite 1102, Tiffin, OH 44883. To order a record via the internet, log on to www.vitalchek.com and follow the prompts for Seneca County. The Vital Statistics Division has a 24-hour turnaround time for all mail/web order birth certificates.

Staff issued 3,437 certified birth certificates and 2,041 certified death certificates in 2007.

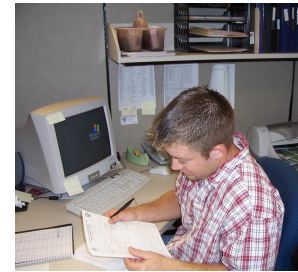

Other Program Information

- Injury Prevention—This is our third year for this grant, which focuses on bike helmet safety and is aimed toward school aged children and their families.
- EPA 319 Grant—The OEPA grant is administered through WSOS Community Action Commission, Inc. with the partici-

pation of five (5) local health departments including: Crawford, Erie, Sandusky, Seneca, and Wyandot. The grant replaced/repared 144 failing home sewage treatment systems over a three (3) year period with grant completion date of Dec. 31, 2007. Seneca County replaced (repared) 56 systems over the course of the grant.

- Food Operations—it is important that new business owners contact us as soon as possible as it takes time for all the necessary approvals.

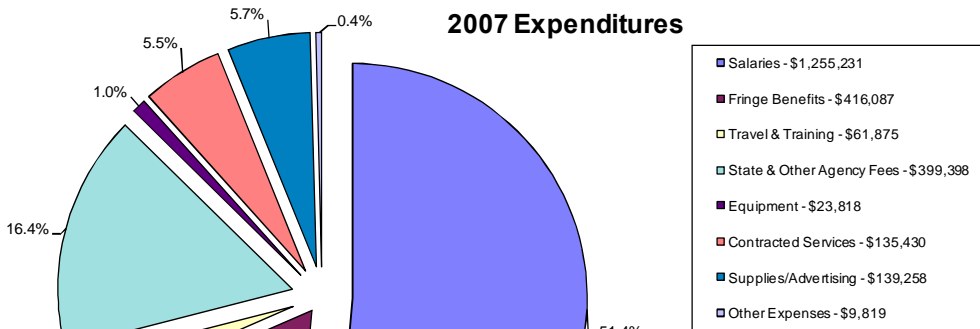

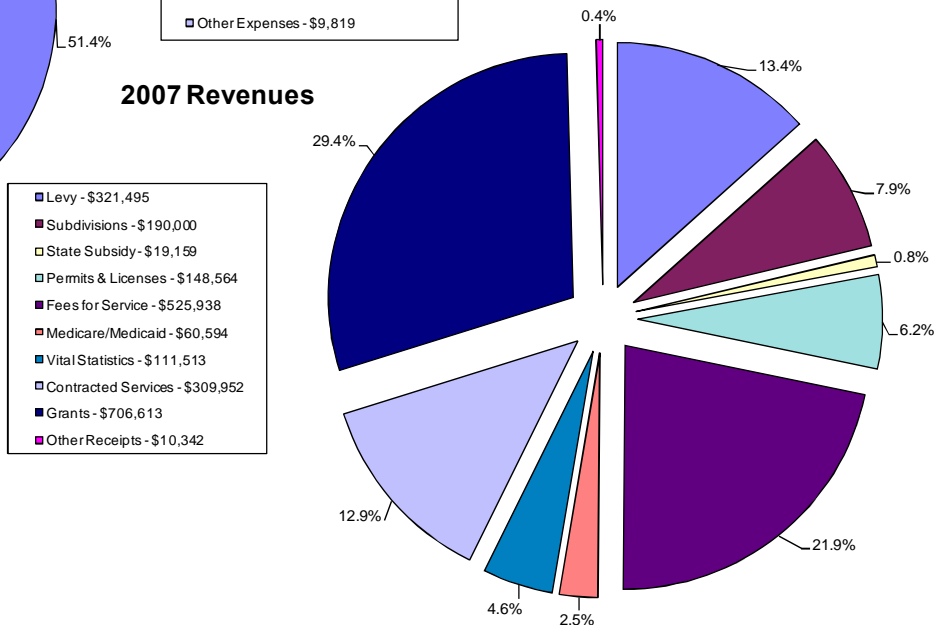

Nursing Division

The Community Health Nursing Division continued to serve our residents with practice intended to preserve the health of the population across the lifespan by emphasizing health promotion, disease prevention and control. Comprehensive health services were provided to individuals, families, and the community-at-large through targeted interventions and programs including child, adolescent, family and adult health, communicable disease control and prevention, immunization, and education. The teen birth rate is the lowest it has been for several years due to the work being done in the adolescent health clinics and the outreach education programs. The lead testing of children rate in Seneca County is higher than ever before and more lead poisoned children have been found and enrolled in our case management services due to the

excellent work of the Northwest Ohio Regional Resource Center for Lead Poisoning Prevention in promoting public and professional lead poisoning awareness, education, and community outreach. Newborn home visits were made to 193 families that include physical assessments for the newborn and mother, education and referral, and follow-up. The certified home care aides provided over 3,200 hours of in home care to senior citizens and 243 visits were made to the senior health check clinics held throughout the county. In 2007, there were 209 reported cases of communicable diseases. Of those, 72% were sexually transmitted diseases. Educational programs were presented in local schools, Youth Center, CROSSWAEH, area health fairs, colleges, Patchworks House, and day care centers to name a few. School nurses made contact with 6,700 children and two mini-grants were obtained to bring Dance, Dance Revolu-

tion to the physical education programs at New Riegel and Tiffin Middle School. The Bureau for Medical Handicaps program continues to serve 244 families with diagnosis, treatment and referral services. Specialty clinics for vision and cardiology are ongoing and well utilized. In the immunization program, 10,581 doses of vaccine were administered. Statistics show the Health District is immunizing 63% of Seneca County's children, and 81% of those are up to date with their immunization status.

WIC Division

Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children

WIC works by providing nutrition education and foods to pregnant women, postpartum women and children to age five. Breastfeeding is encouraged as the normal and healthiest feeding method for baby. In 2007, an average of 1979 Seneca County residents received WIC benefits each month.

In 2007 one of Seneca County's WIC participants was selected as a winner in the National WIC Association's coloring contest for their 2008 calendar. Sammy Stahl had his artwork featured in the calendar that was distributed through WIC clinics nationwide. His art was also chosen for use in the promotional material for the 2008 coloring contest.

Seneca County WIC participates in the Farmer's Market Nutrition Program providing Ohio produce to our participants. This results in increased business for the

farm stands and healthier diets for our families.

Seneca County WIC provides two unique services to our clients. A smoking cessation program is offered to all pregnant participants and has been successful in helping a significant number of pregnant women quit smoking before they deliver. The second service is testing our 7 to 36 month old participants for lead poisoning. Seneca County WIC has tested 1,825 WIC children for lead poisoning between November of 2006 and February of 2008. About 28 children have been identified as potentially having lead poisoning.

WIC is funded through the US Department of Agriculture. Approximately \$1.2 Million in federal tax dollars were returned to Seneca County in food and assistance to WIC Participants.

WIC services are available full time in both Tiffin and Fostoria. Evening hours are avail-

able by appointment. While there are upper income limits for the WIC program, these limits are generous and increase with family size. Any potential participant qualifying for Medicaid qualifies for WIC. We are funded to serve all eligible families. WIC serves traditional as well as non-traditional families.

Dental Clinic

The Seneca County Dental Clinic provides limited dental services to Seneca County residents who do not have a dentist, and who do not have dental insurance. Medicaid is accepted; and for those who are self-pay, patients need to provide proof of "combined household income" to be placed on the sliding fee scale

established by the State. Treatment procedures that are performed at the Seneca County Dental Clinic include: exams, x-rays, fillings, sealants, and extractions.

In 2007, our dentists held 18 clinics, and 85 client visits.
